The Grosse Fuge (German spelling: Große Fuge, also known in English as the Great Fugue or Grand Fugue), Op. 133, is a single-movement composition for string quartet by Ludwig van Beethoven. An immense double fugue, it was universally condemned by contemporary music critics. A reviewer writing for the Allgemeine musikalische Zeitung in 1826 described the fugue as "incomprehensible, like Chinese ...

The Grosse Fuge was never meant to stand on its own, but rather was conceived as the finale of Beethoven's 1825 String Quartet in B-flat, Op. 130. Shortly before, Beethoven had returned to the string quartet after a hiatus of over a dozen years. In 1800 he had produced a set of six (his Opus 18)

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that reflected the same foundation in Haydn classicism as his first symphony and first two piano ...
